#### Introduction

This procedure should be read in conjunction with Motorsport UK's Safeguarding Policies and <u>Procedures</u>.

#### **Recognising Abuse**

Abuse and neglect can occur anywhere; at home, at school, or at a sporting event - we need to be aware of this so that we can spot the signs and take appropriate steps to protect people from further harm.

Abuse, neglect and harm can occur in a number of ways:

We also recognise that some people may be at increased risk, this includes:

- Children and young people and the elderly
- Anyone, regardless of age who is isolated, lonely or does not have a support network around them.
- Anyone regardless of age who has a disability or health condition that makes them more reliant on others for support.

### **Responding to and Managing Concerns**

It is never an option to do nothing if you become aware of a concern to someone's safety. It is of the utmost importance that our response to an allegation is reassuring, appropriate, accurate and does not put the person concerned at increased risk.

If you are made aware about concerning behaviours or actions of others:

As soon as it is appropriate to do so, make a record of the conversation. Record the date, time and location of the conversation and write down the words and phrases used by the person. This will be useful for our Club local record and will be used in any further investigations required.

### **Reporting Concerns**

If you are worried that someone is at risk of harm this must be reported to the Club Safeguarding Officer (CSO). [INSERT CLUB NAME] CSO is the first point of contact and will be contactable at every club event.

If you believe someone is at immediate risk of harm, contact emergency services on 999 or the Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO) if appropriate.

The CSO will follow the appropriate reporting procedure, depending on the type of incident reported to them as outlined in the Motorsport UK Safeguarding Procedures.

The CSO will take appropriate actions which may include:

- Making enquiries and keeping a local record,
- Seeking advice from the Motorsport UK Safeguarding Team,
- Liaising with statutory partners,





• Maintaining accurate records.
